In the 1850's Cochise negotiated a treaty with the white man. In early 1861 he was betrayed by Lt. Bascomb, escaped from Bascomb's tent, but his family was held captive and later executed. In retaliation Cochise began his reign of terror in Arizona and Mexico.

The Apache Wars would last 25 years, until 1886.



Now these are REAL cowboys.





































Very realisticly western looking as we tied our horses to the trees and ate lunch.









Below is Charlie One Horse. He is teaching us the meaning of the paintings on the rock.

This is known as the "Land Shark"






The cool breeze was unbelievable through this shelter. It was extremely comfortable.




Amazing balanced rock formations all throughout the Dragoon Mountains










Charlie One Horse singing an Apache song to guide us on our way
