










Above: The sun hitting Cedar Mesa

The two shots below: The sun actually entering the Goosenecks Gorge








Remember it was the San Juan River that cut the Goosenecks Gorge? Left is the same river, just south of Mexican Hat.



The plaque to the left was out back of the View Lodge Restaurant





This is the view the Plaque is referring to. Left to right they are West Mitten Butte, East Mitten Butte and Merrick Butte. Merrick Butte is named for a man who worked under General Custer when 4,000 Navajos were marched in captivity to Fort Sumner, NM in 1864.






I was early but I decided to check in anyways. I was wondering if they ever worry about the lodge being crushed from above.
