


The Reel west newsletter

Steve blocks the scene with Patti and Marsha. Marsha with a black wig is portraying Juanita. She does an excellent Spanish accent.





Left – Torches? Check! Accelerant? Check! Lighter? Check! Water? Check! Fire Extinguisher? Check! Just in case we really start the church on fire




Waiting for Aaron to say "Action when ready!" Ok, I know what you're thinking – Burn down a church? With the people inside? We are really bad, Bad Guys.






Through the magic of stop-action photography (thanks Chisum), you get to see my best side, moving along the church wall, putting end to all those stinkin' do-gooders inside the church.



Below - Pete Tenderfoot arrives in the Real West.






Yup, real period riffles, cleared and ready for action. We will get to use blanks later on.

Heavenly.




or the life of me I can't remember his name and he printed emails are in the truck. He was kind enough to show me his famous, personal cookbook hat has all the secret recipes.





As you can see in both photos, the clouds have rolled in, the sun is going down, we were losing the light to film by. Aaron finally told Steve is was too dark (right after my scene of course). Steve almost wept because our film was not finished. What were we going to do now? Bonanza Creek Ranch to the rescue. Steve was given permission to finish filming Saturday, at no cost, but had to be off the grounds by 1:30. Everyone cheered. It would have been a big disappointment to ALL of us if we could not have finished the movie.



About 8:30 that slave-driver Steve finally let us eat dinner. Just kidding Steve. This is so much like it would be on a real movie set location shoot – everyone keeps working until its done, even if they have to wait an extra two hours to eat.

This whole experience has been so realistic: do the interior scenes while we still have light; rain, snow, wind, keep rolling; dinner is delayed; actors get bucked off their horses and sent to the hospital (after finishing his scenes, atta boy Rodeo Rankin); action when ready; if you know your scene is coming up, why aren't you on the set?; do you know your lines?; gun misfires; 12-15 hour days.

Just an incredible experience. Thanks Steve and Marcie.

I can say that now because, as you all know, I lost two days writing newsletters due to late nights, so as I write this, I already know how everything turned out.



So this newsletter is dated 4/15, but I am actually writing it on 4/17. I will just continue as if today was the 15th and not try to double up. There is a whole shebang of photos for tomorrow, and I will apologize now about how some of them turned out. I am disappointed. I thought I was a better photographer than that.
