As mentioned above, we drove about 2 ½ hours north to Chama. I won't say too much about Chama since I plan to visit here after the WRAP! party.

I will say that Chama is home to the Cumbres & Toltec Scenic Railroad, which incidentally, is out destination.

This is not the boxcar we used for filming, but it is similar. A wooden Denver & Rio Grande Western boxcar, probably built in the 1920's.

This is our main bad guy, J.T. Ripper, chained and outfitted like the condemned criminal he is, sitting under guard in one of the boxcars. The first scene is about to be filmed.

As in most movies, we are not filming in sequence. This means we shoot the scenes we need wherever we happen to be. Although this IS the actual first scene, we filmed all of the scenes today that we needed the boxcar and train station for, no matter where they appear in the film.





Above is a view of the train yard. There are a lot of train cars here. The place is actually closed until May, but we have permission to be on the premises.

It is true that much of an actor's time on set is spent standing around, waiting for their chance in front of the camera.
