A coxed four heading down-river. There were several sculls, fours, doubles and singles out today.





Left is one of the murals I was speaking of the other day. This one is eleven stories tall.



I believe Kaitlin mentioned that ACL is one of only two venues in the U.S. that also has a recording studio.





ACL also has a freight elevator that the performer's semi's can back right up to and unload their equipment for transport to the stage. This is much easier than wheeling it all in from the street.

The master board









The company break room. They have some interesting art on the walls which you can see below.


















Because Willie Nelson was so instrumental (ha ha) in getting ACL started he has his own balcony where he can step out and have a 'smoke'.


This is the first entry of a timeline on the walls of a hallway











There are so many bars in this venue that Kaitlin told me they are part of the twelve step program, always have a bar within twelve steps.



This is the area above the lights where anything descending from the ceiling will be controlled from. It's not part of the regular tour and it was a very different view of the stage, as you will see.



We had to use flashlights to move around, and I had to turn on the camera flash. I was ducking under the A/C ducting and over guy wires stretched along the floor.








This is a view of the cameras that were currently active. They have many more for the live shows.

Last, but not least, we visited the 3Ten, another smaller venue they use for smaller bands and street concerts. They can open the large patio doors and let the music run wild. Kaitlin offered me a couple free tickets for tonight's concert, but I had never heard of the band, and since it felt weird sitting in the Menger Bar and drinking alone, I thought it would probably feel similar here.

Well, time to 'get back on the road again'. I entered Dead Man's Hole on Google maps and followed their directions until I arrived at a gate across the road. What the hey? Who would think that there would be two streets named Dead Man's Hole near Austin. I followed a lot of single lanes and curving roads, crossed the stream below, and still was only at an intersection. I had to use the directions from Roadside America to get me where I wanted to go.







Yup, it's a hole in the ground. The hole is covered by that steel plate. There is a six inch round hole that you can look through if you want, but I did not have the urge. The story is rather interesting. The hanging tree is gone. I had to fill up this space with something.
